# FACT SHEET

#### WHAT

Public opinion poll results released today show that 88% of registered California voters want major changes to the way police and other emergency services providers respond to 911 calls. Two-thirds (69%) of voters say they want behavioral health professionals to respond either with (35%) or without (34%) law enforcement to non-life threatening situations like mental health crises and concerns about people who are homeless, while 19% want law enforcement to get additional training to respond more effectively.

#### WHY

There is growing nationwide concern that today's 911 system is outdated, leaving police departments to respond to calls outside their skillset, resulting in costly and unnecessary criminal justice involvement and avoidable injuries and even fatalities to people needing help.

## HOW

In August 2022, a representative sample of 9,254 registered California voters responded to an online poll in English and Spanish. Sampling error is estimated to be +/- 2.0.

## WHO

The poll was conducted by the Institute of Governmental Studies (IGS) at UC Berkeley. The Berkeley IGS Poll is a statewide non-partisan survey conducted regularly to understand public opinion on current election and public policy related issues. The poll was commissioned by Public Health Advocates.

## **KEY FINDINGS**

67%

67% of voters think **law enforcement is least equipped to respond to mental health crises**. This includes:

- Voters in San Diego (74%) and Sacramento (72%) compared with those in San Joaquin Valley (62%) and the Inland Empire (62%).
- 76% of American Indians, 74% of Whites, 72% of Blacks, 62% of Asian/Pacific Islanders, and 55% of Latinos.
- 72% of Democrats, 66% of Independents, and 60% of Republicans.

## 69%

69% of voters want **mental health professionals or social workers to respond** to or be included in the response to 911 calls for nonviolent crimes. This includes:

- Voters in the San Francisco Bay Area (75%), the Central Coast (72%), Los Angeles County (65%), and San Joaquin Valley (61%).
- Whites (74%), Blacks and American Indians (69%), Asian/Pacific Islanders (69%) and Latinos (61%).
- Democrats (76%), Independents (67%), and Republicans (56%).
